

In celebration of Mental Health Month, the Office of Student Services (OSS) held a development session for administrators, faculty, and support staff titled "Mental Wellness in Motion: Integrating Well-being Practices in Student Services Work." Held on October 29, 2025 at GSB 108, the session gathered OSS professionals dedicated to fostering a healthier and more supportive work environment.

The session focused on the growing importance of mental wellness in student services and offered practical strategies for integrating well-being practices into daily operations. commitment to In its continued maintaining a safe and drug-free academic environment, the Office of Student Services (OSS) of De La Salle (DLSU-D) University-Dasmariñas officially renewed its Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) with the De La Salle Medical and Health Sciences Institute (DLSMHSI) Drug Testing Unit on October 10, 2025 at the OSS Conference Room. This renewal reaffirms the university's commitment to student welfare and compliance with national regulations.

Under the renewed partnership, DLSMHSI, a Department of Health (DOH)-accredited drug testing center, will conduct the Annual Mandatory Random Drug Testing Upperclassmen (AMRDTU) for School Years 2025-2026 and 2026-2027. The agreement ensures the continued delivery of professional, confidential, and DOH-compliant drug testing services.

The AMRDTU remains a cornerstone of OSS's efforts to promote student welfare and campus safety. It aligns with the Commission on Higher Education (CHED) Memorandum Order No. 18, Series of 2018, which mandates drug testing in higher education institutions as part of the national strategy to address youth drug abuse.

This renewed collaboration strengthens DLSU-D and DLSMHSI's shared commitment to drug prevention through institutional support, medical expertise, and adherence to national policies.

# SWAFO Launches SPADE during CEAT Townhall Meeting

On October 1, 2025, the College of Architecture, Engineering, and (CEAT) Technology Student Government successfully hosted the CEAT Townhall Meeting: "Your Voice, Our Action." This gathering provided a platform for open dialogue between students and administrators addressed key concerns related to academics, facilities, and student life.

The SPADE session was facilitated by SWAFO Director Mr. Ruel Elias with support from SWAFO formatores. His presentation outlined key aspects of the university's discipline policy and student code of conduct, emphasizing the importance of proactive formation in maintaining a respectful and safe learning environment.

### SWC Director Leads Mental Health Training for AEA and ERC Personnel

October 28 and 29, 2025 - In support of Salle University-Dasmariñas' (DLSU-D) commitment to fostering a inclusive caring and campus environment, the Student Wellness Center (SWC), in collaboration with Emilio Aklatang Aguinaldo (AEA) conducted a focused training session for library personnel titled "Handling Students with Mental Health Needs."

The session aimed to enhance the awareness and responsiveness of AEA-ERC personnel in dealing with students who may exhibit emotional distress or behavioral concerns while using library facilities.

The discussion was facilitated by SWC Director Agnes Gibas, RGC, who provided practical insiahts on recognizing early signs of psychological distress and responding appropriately within the library's supportive setting. She emphasized the importance of empathy, confidentiality, and deescalation techniques when managing emotionally charged situations.

The session also explored common mental health concerns encountered in academic settings—such as anxiety, depression, and stress-related behaviors.

Ms. Gibas guided participants through role-playing scenarios and case exercises to help them respond with sensitivity and professionalism. She stressed that being familiar with the different characteristics and behavioral manifestations of mental health issues would provide them with the understanding needed to respond knowledgeably, confidently, and appropriately to students in need.

To encourage more personal engagement, the participants were divided into two groups, attending sessions on October 28 and 29 respectively. This format fostered an engaging, lively, and more meaningful discussion and sharing of insights.

This initiative highlights the university's holistic approach to student wellness, recognizing that mental health support extends beyond counseling offices and is a shared community effort. Library staff members play a vital role in the university's care network, serving as frontline partners in ensuring that every student feels seen, supported, and valued.

### 267th NROTCU Boosts Disaster Readiness at Operation SAFE Summit

In response to the increasing frequency of typhoons, earthquakes, and other natural disasters. De Salle La Universities across the country came together for the first time to promote preparedness and resilience through the Operation SAFE: DRRM Summit held on October 25, 2025 at Ugnayang La Salle Salle, De La University Dasmariñas.

The summit aimed to equip participants with practical knowledge and hands-on techniques in Disaster Risk Reduction and Management (DRRM), fostering a community of Lasallians who are ready to respond effectively in times of crisis.

Seizing this opportunity, the 267th Naval Researve Officers Training Corps (NROTCU) actively participated in support of the institution's advocacy, "Fund Resilience, Not Disaster." Their involvement reflected the Corps' ongoing commitment to developing proactive leaders and cadets who are capable of assisting those in need when emergencies arise.

The training, spearheaded by the Coast Guard Auxiliary Group and W.I.S.A.R. (Wilderness Search and Rescue Philippines) introduced participants to vital life-saving skills such as trauma care, survival swimming, boat handling, and CPR. The Corps continues to strengthen and apply these techniques, further enhancing their ability to make critical life-saving decisions and take action in high-risk scenarios.

The event concluded with closing remarks from Mr Frederick Godinez, Director of the General Service Office who expressed hope that the participants may never have to use the emergency techniques they learned, but affirmed that if such a time comes, Lasallians will be ready to serve and protect their communities.

Their presentation familiaried campus advisers with the new financial system, helping them better manage and monitor the trust funds of their respective organizations.

An engaging open forum followed where advisers shared their experiences, challenges, and insights. One topic of discussion centered on policies concerning the LGBTQIA+ community, including the possibility of forming a recognized student organization and conducting advocacy-driven activities within the University.

Mr. Joel Refuerzo, Coordinator of the Performing Arts Group, responded by highlighting the university's growing culture of inclusivity and openness. He expressed optimism that initiatives could find greater acceptance over time. Dr. Vargas further clarified may any group apply accreditation as a Recognized Student Organization (RSO) by complying with the requirements set by the Council of Student Organizations (CSO).

Other concerns raised during the session included the allocation and utilization of organization trust funds, whether these could vary depending on the size or population of each program or organization. The addressed invited speakers these questions and provided quidance to ensure transparency and accountability in fund management.


### A Legacy of Purpose and Empowerment

# SWC Counselor Shares Guidance Insights in Psychology Webinar

The Psychology Department of De La Salle University-Dasmariñas (DLSU-D) hosted a webinar in line with the subject Introduction to Counseling and Psychotherapy. Titled "Navigating the Counselor's Compass: Journey, Values and Ethical Practice," the session featured SWC Guidance Counselor Ms. Glessie Anadilla-Cantada as the resource facilitator.

Ms. Anadilla-Cantada shared her personal counseling journey, from the fundamental qualities of an effective counselor to the importance of upholding professional ethics in guidance counseling.

The webinar aimed to deepen students' understanding of how personal experiences shape professional growth, identify traits effective kev of counselors, and explore the values that ethical decision-making, grounded in the principles and codes of ethics for responsible practice.

The participants, AB and BS Psychology students were introduced to practical models for handling ethical dilemmas referencing both the American School Counselor Association (ASCA) and Philippine Guidance and Counseling Association (PGCA) Codes of Ethics.

The discussion also highlighted the importance of proper documentation. emphasized The speaker that documentation must be thorough and consistent, regardless of age, gender, or social status of clients. She reminded attendees that experience or seniority do not exempt counselors from ethical responsibilities. Adequate documentation, she noted, protects counselors from legal claims and compliance ensures with ethical standards.

To conclude, Ms. Anadilla-Cantada shared a passage from the Humanistic Perspective as a reminder of the kind of service counselors are called in: "Not every material gain can outshine the pleasures one derives from counseling when one enjoys the humanity and humanness of people and when one sees a positive transformation in the student."

She underscored that the true reward of counseling lies in connecting with people human level on а understanding their emotions, struggles, and stories and witnessing growth, change, and improvement through guidance and support. Overall, the webinar not only enriched students' knowledge of counseling ethics and practices but also inspired future practitioners to cultivate compassion and integrity in their future careers.

# SMPO hosts Campus Journalism and Press Freedom Webinar

The Student Media and Publications Office (SMPO) of De La Salle University–Dasmariñas (DLSU-D) hosted a webinar titled "Campus Journalism and Press Freedom: Essentials for Today's Student Journalist" via Microsoft Teams. The session aimed to deepen student journalists' understanding of ethical reporting, press freedom, and their vital role in upholding democratic values.

Guest speakers Atty. Dennis Maldo of the DLSU-D College of Law and Jelo Ritzhie Mantaring of NewsWatch Plus shared their expertise and experiences on the legal and practical dimensions of journalism. Atty. Maldo explored the philosophical and constitutional foundations of freedom of expression and of the press, emphasizing the importance of exercising these rights responsibly within the bounds of the law.

Mantaring, meanwhile, discussed the contemporary challenges and opportunities facing campus journalists. He urged participants to adapt to the evolving media landscape, diversify content platforms, and remain grounded in fairness and truth.

**SMPO** Director **Jemily** Puchero highlighted the significance of the webinar aspiring student for journalists, "The webinar was especially significant for our apprentices who are just starting out as campus writers. It them recognize philosophical relevance and the practical responsibility of exercising freedom of expression and of the press within the bounds of the law," she said.

She added that the event reinforced SMPO's mission to promote integrity and accountability in campus journalism as it guided the participants in creating digital content responsibly and ethically.

Participants were also encouraged to explore the digital sphere more proactively by learning how to prioritize stories, gather reliable data, and engage audiences through meaningful and balanced reporting. The webinar speakers reminded them to keep in touch with newsmakers while giving voice to ordinary people whose stories often remain untold.

Through initiatives like this, SMPO continues nurture ethical. to responsible, and empowered Lasallian journalists by equipping them with the knowledge, values, and digital competencies essential for navigating todav's fast-changing media environment.

# PRC and Board of Guidance and Counseling Conduct Virtual Visit to DLSU-D Student Wellness Center

The Professional Regulation Commission (PRC) and the Board of Guidance and Counseling conducted a virtual institutional visit to the Student Wellness Center of De La Salle University-Dasmariñas (DLSU-D) on October 22. The activity aimed to assess the university's compliance with national standards for guidance and counseling programs and to strengthen partnership between the PRC Board and higher education institutions in the promotion of mental health and professional guidance and counseling practice.

PRC representative Hon. Arnel Gagalac and PRC Board members of Guidance and Counseling Hon. Elena Morada and Hon. Carmelita Pabiton attended the online visit. Representing DLSU-D were Agnes Gibas, RGC, Director of the Student Wellness Center, licensed SWC quidance counselors Demetria Panganiban, RGC, Anna Michelle Garingo, RGC and Glessie Cantada, RGC. DLSU-D Dean of Student Services Office Dr. Jacqueline Morta opened the session with welcoming remarks.

During the visit, PRC and Board members engaged in discussions on SWC's structure, services. and particularly its student programs, mental health and wellness initiatives, and counseling support systems. Ms. Gibas presented an overview of the university's history and SWC's guidance program, highlighting innovations in counseling, wellness campaigns, and inter-office collaboration for holistic student development.

PRC commended DLSU-D for its sustained adherence to ethical and professional standards. including updated practitioners licenses, continuing professional development, counselor-student compliance with ratios, and implementation of relevant student programs and services. The Board also provided recommendations for aligning SWC's core and support with services updated evaluation frameworks.

In their messages, Hon. Pabiton and Hon. Morada expressed appreciation for DLSU-D's active role in mental health advocacy. They emphasized that the visit, an inaugural initiative for the Board, was not only an evaluation but also a platform for building synergy between regulatory bodies and practitioners to ensure quality guidance services in educational institutions.

Ms. Gibas and the SWC Team thanked the PRC and the Board for the opportunity to present the university's SWC initiatives and reaffirmed their commitment to providing accessible, student-centered, and ethical counseling services rooted in Lasallian values.

The virtual visit concluded with an open forum where both parties exchanged insights and recommendations for continuous improvement and collaboration in advancing the guidance and counseling profession in the Philippines.




