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# OSS kicks-off lecture on fostering a customer-centric organization

Dr. Jacqueline Morta, the Dean of OSS, delivered her welcome remarks underscoring the challenges faced by Student Affairs and Services practitioners in meeting the evolving needs of students. Dr. Morta highlighted the importance of raising the bar for student support services to align with students' expectations and emphasized the need to prioritize students in all aspects of their work. # SWAFO orients DLSU-D dorm residents

**The Student Welfare and Formation Office (SWAFO) graced the annual DLSU-D Student Dormitory Orientation held on September 11, 2024, at the Waling-waling Multipurpose Hall of the DLSU-D dormitory.**

SWAFO Formatore, Mr. Johnatan G. Villa discussed the role of SWAFO and the rules and regulations of the University pertaining to student discipline, as contained in the Student Handbook.

Mr. Villa shared that non-adherence to the dress code policy was a common violation among dorm occupants. He reminded them to “always bring your identification card and/or certificate of registration (COR) when going out of dorm premises.”

Additionally, he reiterated that smoking or using e-cigarettes/vaporizers, and drinking liquor inside the University, including the dorm premises, are not allowed, and considered as major offenses, as stipulated in the Student Handbook.

Apart from Mr. Villa, Mr. Albert John R. Puchero, Director of the Ancillary and Asset Management Office also welcomed and thanked the occupants for choosing the DLSU-D Student Dormitory as their home away from home.

In the same manner, he stressed the necessity and importance of following University rules and regulations, particularly those that apply to dorm occupants.

Approximately 150 residents from the male and female dorms, and Residencia San Miguel attended the event.

# CIC Orientation Highlights Integrity in Campus Leadership

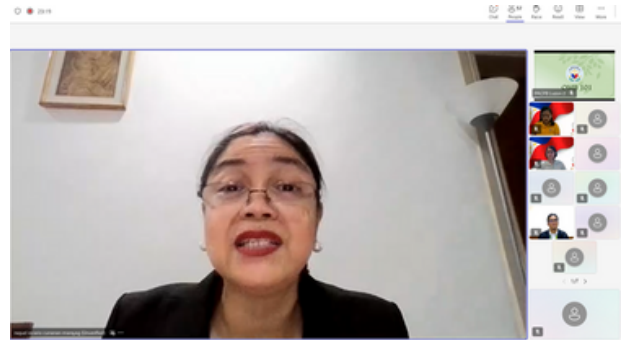

The orientation aimed to equip young leaders with the knowledge necessary to foster a graft-intolerant society while also preparing them for the CIC Accreditation Year 2024-2025.

Dr. Eric A. Vargas, Director of the Student Development and Activities Office (SDAO), delivered the Inspirational Message on behalf of the OSS Dean, stressing the vital role of integrity in leadership and nation-building.



CIC invited Atty. Raquel Rosario M. Cunanan-Marayag, Director of the Public Assistance and Corruption Prevention Bureau, Office of the Ombudsman-Luzon as resource speaker. The Student Welfare and Formation Office (SWAFO) held an orientation session as an introduction to its Formation Program at the SWAFO Transaction Area on September 18, 2024.

Formation Program participants will undergo five stages namely, Monitoring, Seminar, Assessment and Evaluation, Presentation, and Approval.

Committed to providing human and Christian education to young Lasallians, SWAFO introduced its formation program in 2004, and it has been continuously running for two decades. This was designed to afford students with major offenses the chance to improve and eventually obtain a Good Moral Character certificate.

# At Your Service!

*In the ever-evolving landscape of student services, it is often the passion and dedication of the people behind the scenes that keep the spirit of an institution alive.*

*This September, the Office of Student Services (OSS) shines the spotlight on Mr. Joel Refuerzo, the tireless Coordinator of the Cultural Arts Office (CAO) at De La Salle University-Dasmariñas. Having served for 21 years in his role, Mr. Refuerzo has proven to be an invaluable asset to the university, shaping not only the cultural programs but also the lives of countless students who have benefited from his mentorship.*



## A Journey Fueled by Passion

Mr. Refuerzo's journey with the CAO began in the latter part of the school year 2003-2004, when the former CAO Coordinator, Ms. Joy Parohinog, offered him the position. At the time, Mr. Refuerzo was serving as the De La Salle Dasmariñas Alumni Association, Inc. (DLSDAAI) Liaison Officer. Without hesitation, he accepted the offer, grateful for the trust placed in him by Ms. Parohinog and the late OSS Dean, Felicitacion Antonio. Now, more than two decades later, Joel reflects on his decision with pride.

*"I knew my heart was in it," he shared. "Cliché as it may sound, I simply grabbed the opportunity. Opportunity knocks once, why neglect it? Give it a try."*

From those early days, his deep passion for the performing arts has driven his work. He fondly recalls his own experiences as a student when his talent for the arts blossomed during his time with TEATRO Lasalliana. It was this personal connection to the arts and his commitment to student development that shaped his approach as CAO Coordinator.

Under his leadership, the Cultural Arts Office has played a vital role in nurturing students' talents and leadership skills through the performing arts. The office's mission is to provide students with opportunities to explore and promote culture and the arts both within and beyond the confines of the university.

Through diverse activities — from stage productions and concerts to cultural exchanges and outreach programs, CAO fosters an environment where students can grow artistically while also developing key life skills.

*"The Cultural Arts Office is committed to motivating and nourishing the continued development of diverse cultures and arts in and out of the university," Joel explains.*

*"Our Performing Arts Groups (PAG) are at the forefront of these efforts, spearheading various programs that allow students to express themselves and develop their skills."*

His belief that the arts serve as a "training ground" for students to prepare for the "real world" is a philosophy that permeates every initiative of the CAO. Beyond being mere performers, he views his students as "student leaders" who are not only skilled artists but also individuals with a profound understanding and appreciation of culture.

## Overcoming Challenges and Celebrating Triumphs

Similar to many in the academic and cultural sectors, Joel faced unprecedented challenges during the COVID-19 pandemic. The shift to online platforms was particularly difficult for the CAO, as they were used to having face-to-face meetings and engagements. However, despite the hurdles, PAG students and alumni rose to the occasion and together, they found creative ways to continue their activities virtually. Joel attributes their resilience and creativity to maintaining the office's presence during this challenging time. *"Our PAG kids were so creative, artistic, and technically equipped. Our presence was felt, and we continued serving the Lasallian community through online platforms,"* he recalled.

Another major challenge for Mr. Refuerzo was balancing his responsibilities as both the CAO Coordinator and the Student Activities Office (SAO) Coordinator for a period.

With nearly 30 student organizations under his care, including the Performing Arts Groups, he admitted that balancing both roles was incredibly difficult. *"Looking back, I could not imagine how I handled all the responsibilities given to me. Thank God I survived,"* he said with a laugh.

However, alongside these challenges, there have been notable triumphs. In 2019, under his leadership, the La Salle Filipiniana Dance Company (LSFDC) and the DLSU-D Chorale made history by competing in an international competition in South Korea and winning several awards. More recently, the LSFDC won three first-place awards in the International Dance Organization's World Folklore Festival. For Mr. Refuerzo, these achievements reflect not just the hard work of the students but the legacy of excellence that the CAO continues to build.

While international awards are uncertainly a highlight for the CAO, Joel believes that the true measure of success lies in the impact the office has had on its students' lives. He takes great pride in the achievements of PAG alumni, many of whom have pursued successful careers while remaining humble and grateful for their experiences at the CAO.

*"What I consider to be CAO's greatest achievement is the alumni themselves,"* he stated. *"Seeing them thrive in their chosen fields and recognizing the lessons they gained as members and student leaders of PAG fills me with pride."*

He also mentioned that PAG's outreach programs stand out as one their most meaningful activities. One such program took place in Patungan in Maragondon, Cavite where PAG officers led a three-day immersion and conducted free art workshops for children. *"Seeing the students reach out and engage with the community was heartwarming. It was a different kind of fulfillment,"* he said.

Now in his 21st year as the Coordinator, Joel reflected on what has kept him going despite the challenges. *"For over 20 years, PAG and OSS have been a FAMILY,"* he said.

*"The support and trust I receive from the OSS family, along with the respect from PAG members, alumni, and trainers, have been the reasons I've chosen to stay."*

*As he looks to the future, Joel is hopeful that the values of camaraderie, dedication, and love for the arts will continue to guide the CAO.*

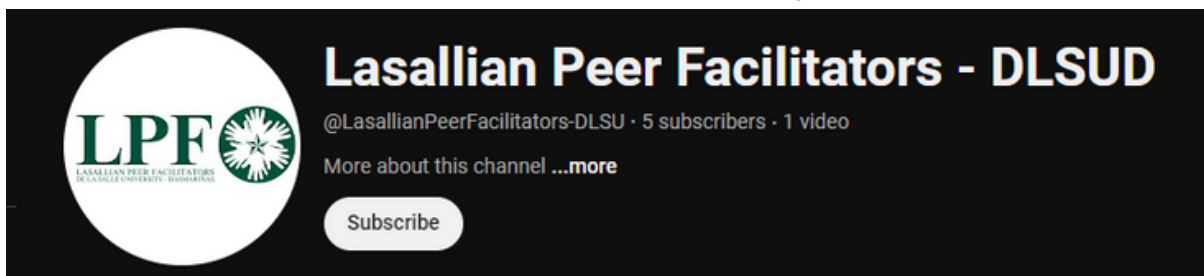

# CCJE Dean Delivers Lecture on Legal Foundations in Student Discipline Investigation

The Office of Student Services (OSS) spearheaded a seminar for Student Welfare and Formation Office (SWAFO) Formatores on the legal foundations of student discipline investigations. The seminar took place at the OSS Conference Room on September 20, 2024.

Dr. Rodel Esmilla, the Dean of the College of Criminal Justice Education (CCJE) discussed key considerations for conducting disciplinary investigations in tertiary education, guidelines for evaluating evidence in student discipline investigations, and the steps to ensure that due process complies with legal standards.

Dr. Esmilla emphasized that the legal basis for student discipline in tertiary education in the Philippines is grounded in constitutional guarantees and specific laws and regulations.

*“Academic institutions must adhere to the principles of due process, equal protection, and privacy, and provide clear appeal mechanisms as outlined in national laws, Commission on Higher Education (CHED) guidelines, and the academic institution's internal policies to ensure fairness, transparency, and respect for students' rights throughout the disciplinary process,” he stated.*

Dean Esmilla also suggested future seminars/training be conducted to further equip SWAFO Formatores with knowledge and skills to conduct student discipline investigations.

The seminar is part of the OSS Administrators, Faculty, and Support Staff Development Program (OSS-AFSSDP) for the 2024-2025 school year which aims to enhance the investigative skills of the SWAFO Formatores in handling student disciplinary cases.



# SWAFO hosts first learning session on SPADE

To uphold the university's standards and values, support student success, and foster a positive and conducive learning environment, the Student Welfare and Formation Office (SWAFO) officially rolled out its "Special Program on Advanced Discipline Education (SPADE)" on September 25, 2024, during University Break.

SWAFO Director, Mr. Ruel Elias explained the noble intention of SPADE as an intervention mechanism of the office to help reduce the incidence of violations and appreciate the outcome of finishing the degree with a clean discipline record. He also provided the most recent data on minor and major offenses by college based on historical records.

However, Mr. Rodelio Figueroa, Assistant to the Director, discussed SWAFO's role and the services it provides. Heads of the different sections namely, Mr. Jonathan Villa, Mr. Jesus Rex Ceballos, Mr. Ervin Ronnie Doroteo, and Ms. Loren Peñano also gave presentations on their respective areas of responsibility.



Through this initiative, participants were further enlightened by the responses they received relative to the questions and concerns raised towards the end of the session. The participants viewed the SPADE for student leaders as timely and relevant overall. The fact that student leaders offer an overall excellent rating also demonstrated how much they valued the discipline education program of SWAFO.

50 student leaders from various recognized student organizations comprised the first batch of SPADE participants.

The #YourPAPCon2024 provided three action-packed days filled with opportunities to learn from and interact with various distinguished international and local keynote and plenary speakers, displaying PAP's commitment to global and local perspectives. The convention took place at the Baguio Cultural and Convention Center from September 26-27, 2024, and concluded with paper presentations at Saint Louis University on September 28, 2024.

Participants explored diverse topics, including Assessment Psychology, Clinical Psychology, Counseling Psychology, Developmental Psychology, Industrial & Organizational Psychology, and Social Psychology. Special Interest Groups (SIG) such as, Teaching Psychology SIG, LGBT Psychology SIG, Sports and Exercise Psychology SIG, Psychology Practitioners in Public Service SIG, Positive Psychology SIG, Environmental Psychology SIG, Research in Psychology, and Persons with Disabilities (PWD) Psychology SIG also presented their best practices.

As Dr. Christopher Hernandez, PGCA President, remarked “Professionals should continue striving for excellence in their own fields.”
