#### Integrating Service-Learning in the Philosophy and Psychology Department

QUEST Program Coordinator, Dr. Maria Theresa Gochuico, and QUEST Project Officers, Lorenzo Centino, Jr. and Iris Diorella Andaya, provided input on the integration of QUEST for the Philosophy and Psychology Department during a departmental meeting on February 26, 2025, at JFH 309. The primary objective of this meeting was to elucidate the process of integrating Service-Learning (S-L) into the department's curriculum, specifically targeting one of its degree programs. The session served as a continuation of the QUEST faculty orientation held on November 14, 2024. Building upon the foundational knowledge imparted during the orientation, this meeting aimed to provide faculty members with a comprehensive, step-by-step framework for the incorporation of S-L into their courses.

The session began with an in-depth introduction to Service-Learning, highlighting its benefits such as enhanced critical thinking, cultural competence, and community relationships. The main focus was a detailed, step-by-step guide for integrating S-L into the department's degree program, including course selection, project development, and community partnerships. Attendees were provided with standardized templates for documenting S-L activities to ensure systematic implementation and evaluation.

The integration of Service-Learning into the Philosophy and Psychology Department represents a significant advancement in the department's commitment to delivering a holistic education. As the department progresses with the integration of S-L, it is anticipated that additional degree programs will adopt this innovative educational approach, thereby reinforcing the university's position as a leader in academic excellence and community engagement.





#### LCDC and CBAA Council Discuss Updates on HANGO Project

Faculty members from the Lasallian Community Development Center (LCDC), led by Director Dr. Socorro Grace M. One of the key focuses of the meeting was to explore strategies for involving more beneficiaries in the HANGO Project. The council discussed potential partnerships with local organizations and community groups to extend the project's reach. By expanding the network of beneficiaries, the project aims to create a broader impact and support more families in need.

The session also addressed the integration of service-learning into two or more degree programs within the college. This approach aims to provide students with practical, hands-on experiences that complement their academic learning.

The meeting underscored the importance of collaboration between LCDC and CBAA in achieving the project's goals. Community Development Coordinator Jhelyn Relopez, QUEST Coordinator Dr. Maria Theresa Gochuico, QUEST Project Officer Iris Diorella Andaya, and former LCDC CBAA Extension In-Charge Melanie Malabanan were present to share their insights and contribute to the discussion.

The meeting concluded with a renewed commitment to advancing the HANGO Project's mission. The participants agreed on the need for continuous monitoring and evaluation to ensure the project's effectiveness and sustainability. Plans were made to implement the discussed strategies and to hold follow-up meetings to review progress and make necessary adjustments.





Commemorating the 39th EDSA People Power Anniversary: Our Seas, Our Rights, Our Future!

As we celebrate the 39th anniversary of the EDSA People Power Revolution, we are reminded of our collective strength in upholding democracy, national sovereignty, and the protection of our natural resources. These same principles were at the heart of the West Philippine Sea Forum: **Environmental Impact and Geopolitical Dynamics and Regional Security**, held last February 21, 2025, at Ugnayang La Salle, De La Salle University-Dasmariñas.

Three resource persons, **Dr**. **Renato De Castro**, Professor, DLSU, **Dr**. **Jonathan Anticamara**, Professor, UP Institute of Biology, and **Col Enrico Gil C Ileto PA (MNSA)**, Chief, Public Affairs Division, Office of the Deputy Chief of Staff for Civil Military Operations, J7, AFP, shared their expertise to address the detrimental impacts of the West Philippine Sea disputes on the maritime environment and biodiversity and the geopolitical dynamics and regional security concerns surrounding the Philippines' legal victory in an international arbitration case against China.

Therefore, the forum brought together experts, policymakers, and advocates to discuss the environmental threats facing the West Philippine Sea, the geopolitical forces shaping regional security, and the critical role of every Filipino in safeguarding our maritime sovereignty. The discussions emphasized the urgent need to protect our marine resources, defend our territorial integrity, and promote sustainable development for the benefit of present and future generations. As the EDSA People Power Revolution show the world the power of a people united for a common cause, it is also an urgent call of the present time to muster similar strength of solidarity to defend our West Philippine Sea.

As we honor the spirit of EDSA, let us continue to stand together in defending what is rightfully ours. The West Philippine Sea is our seas, our rights, and our future—and it is our duty to protect it.



### RESOURCE GENERATION REPORT



The ₱459,847.38 raised in February 2025 reflects a well-supported fundraising effort, with a significant portion coming from crowdfunding activities. While cash contributions dominated, the role of in-kind donations remains valuable in supplementing financial resources. Moving forward, continued donor engagement and diversified funding strategies will be key to sustaining these initiatives.

#### 1. Cash Donations: ₱433,637.38 (94.3%)

- The majority of the donations (94.3%) were in cash, indicating a strong preference among donors for monetary contributions.
- Cash donations provide flexibility, allowing funds to be allocated according to immediate and strategic needs, such as operational costs, program support, and emergency assistance.
- The large sum of cash donations suggests successful fundraising efforts, possibly through targeted campaigns, institutional partnerships, and community-driven support.

#### 2. In-Kind Donations: ₱26,210.00 (5.7%)

- Although in-kind donations account for a smaller portion, they remain valuable in reducing direct costs.
- These contributions may include essential goods such as food, clothing, educational materials, or services, directly benefiting recipients.
- The presence of in-kind donations suggests that donors are engaged in the cause beyond financial giving, offering tangible support where needed.
