Santos, alongside Mr. Richard Tanglao, Sales and Marketing Manager for Aviation at PTC Holdings, met with the College Deans of De La Salle University–Dasmariñas (DLSU-D), to explore multi-disciplinary career pathways.

As a premier flight training center located in Subic Bay, PTC Aviation and First Aviation Academy are widely recognized for their elite pilot cadetship and state-of-the-art Tecnam fleet. Beyond flight training, the academy aims to provide a holistic industry experience through a structured On-the-Job Training (OJT) program. This initiative would allow students from the Colleges of Business Administration and Accountancy (CBAA), Engineering, Architecture and Technology (CEAT), Liberal Arts and Communication (CLAC), and Tourism and Hospitality Management (CTHM) to gain hands-on experience in specialized areas such as aircraft maintenance, aviation logistics, corporate communications, and premium guest services.

CEAT's Architecture Department and PHILASA Meet to Plan Architecture Curriculum

Fifteen (15) Social Entrepreneurship (SE) Champions from various colleges of De La Salle University–Dasmariñas journeyed to Brgy. Tua, Magallanes, Cavite for a meaningful community exposure led by LCDC Director, Dr. Maria Theresa Gochuico and LCDC SE Project Officer Rona Serrano, together with SE Champions from different colleges, faculty from University Research Office (URO) and the National Service Training Program (NSTP).

The visit went beyond an academic requirement and became an opportunity for genuine engagement with the community. The community exposure reinforced the university's commitment to social entrepreneurship as a pathway toward inclusive and sustainable development. The Lasallian Community Development Center, in partnership with the Office of the Provincial Agriculturist (OPA), conducted an Organic Farming Training on February 21, 2026 at the Covered Court of Barangay Tua, Magallanes. A total of 35 participants took part in the activity—32 farmers from the Barangay Tua Farmers Agriculture Cooperative (BaTuFACoop) and 3 Barangay Officials.

Mr. Mario Rotairo, Senior Agriculturist of OPA, facilitated lectures on organic agriculture, fertilizers and insecticides, providing valuable insights for farmers engaged in coffee, coconut, and vegetable production. During the demonstration, Mr. Alvin Espiritu of OPA showcased the preparation of organic fertilizer using fish gills and trimmings. These practices support sustainable development by improving the health of farmers and consumers while reducing environmental impact.

Participants also shared positive feedback, noting that they gained practical and sustainable techniques in producing organic fertilizers using materials that are often discarded as waste.

DLSU-D Delegation Takes Part in the 40th Anniversary of the People Power Revolution

Participating in the “Tayo ang People Power @40” gathering on February 25, the DLSU-D delegation took part in activities that honored the spirit of unity, courage, and active citizenship that shaped our nation’s history.

The commemoration brought together various sectors through a prayerful march, meaningful cultural expressions, and a collective program that reaffirmed the call for integrity, justice, and accountable leadership. By taking part in this milestone event, DLSU-D echoed the enduring message that People Power lives on through informed, engaged, and socially responsible citizens.

Hybrid Forum “Apat na Dekada ng EDSA 40: People Power — Demokrasya, Ano Na?”



A hybrid forum titled “Apat na Dekada ng EDSA 40: People Power — Demokrasya, Ano Na?” was conducted on 25 February 2026, from 2:00 to 4:00 PM, at Tanghalang Julian Felipe. The activity was organized by the Lasallian Justice and Peace Commission (LJPC) in coordination with 14 Lasallian schools nationwide, which participated through Zoom, with each school conducting its own on-site and online engagements. The forum aimed to revisit and critically examine the state of Philippine democracy forty years after EDSA I. On-site participants included 57 students from the Political Science and Hospitality Management programs, along with 9 faculty members.

The forum opened with the talk “Bakit Hindi Napagtibay ang Demokrasya? 40 Taon Pagkatapos ng EDSA Uno,” which presented an in-depth discussion on the challenges of democratic consolidation in the post-EDSA period. This was followed by school-level workshop sessions, where students from the 14 Lasallian schools engaged in breakout discussions guided by three key questions focusing on democratic practice, civic engagement, and social responsibility. During the plenary sharing, DLSU-D was spotlighted, with student participants presenting their workshop outputs via Zoom alongside two other Lasallian schools. The activity also served as the platform for the announcement of ArtVocacy 2.0, where DLSU-D received two Second Place recognitions, one from the Basic Education Division and one from the College. The forum successfully underscored the importance of sustained critical dialogue, active collaboration among Lasallian institutions, and meaningful youth participation in reflecting on the state of Philippine democracy and promoting its continued strengthening beyond EDSA I.

LCDC Supports Launch of St. Br. Miguel Academy's First Saturday Gathering in Dasmariñas



The Lasallian Community Development Center (LCDC) proudly supported the successful launch of the St. Br. Miguel Academy (SBMA) First Saturday Gathering held today in Gawad Kalinga Piela with 20 children, aged 5-12 years old, from the community. This gathering marks the first Saturday class of the FSC aspirants and contacts, joined by the Residencia Brothers' Community live-in participants, as part of their continuing apostolate formation.

This newly opened SBMA chapter in Dasmariñas adds to the growing number of SBMAs established across various Brothers' communities, all dedicated to nurturing young Lasallians in the spirit of Faith, Service, and Communion in Mission.

During the morning session, the aspirants and contacts engaged in catechism lessons and values formation activities with children from the Gawad Kalinga (GK) Piela community. Through storytelling, interactive discussions, and character-building exercises, the session provided a meaningful opportunity for the participants to live out their mission of evangelization and accompaniment.

SBMA serves as an ongoing apostolate of the FSC aspirants and contacts, aiming to support public school students by strengthening their understanding of Christian teachings and core values—an initiative that aligns closely with the Lasallian commitment to holistic and transformative education.



On February 3, 2026, the University Student Government (USG) met with the Advancement and Alumni Relations Office (AARO) to propose initiatives aimed at enhancing student campus mobility.

In response to the University's transition to a 75:25 ratio of onsite to asynchronous classes, a significant increase in student presence on campus was observed. This shift has consequently intensified the demand for sustainable, convenient, and accessible in-campus transportation, particularly for students with classes varying between academic buildings and facilities situated far apart, a challenge further impacted by the expansive grounds of the university.

To address this, the USG proposed the provision of a campus bicycle service that would provide students with free access to bicycles. This initiative aims to offer a practical and eco-friendly mobility solution while supporting the University's sustainability goals and enhancing students' day-to-day campus mobility.

In addition, the USG is preparing a proposal for the semestral provision of free jeepney rides for the Lasallian community. This initiative seeks to improve accessibility and help students travel more efficiently between campus buildings and key facilities.

DLSU-D Explores Potential Collaboration with Schneider Electric



Schneider Electric, a global leader in energy management and automation, presented proposed partnership opportunities focused on learning, professional development, and employment pathways. The meeting highlighted the company's commitment to supporting academic institutions by bridging industry and education.

The Schneider Electric delegation was led by Ms. Maria Catrine Go, Employer Branding Specialist for the Philippines, and Mr. Andrew Nugraha Patty, Employer Branding Lead for East Asia. During the discussion, they introduced various programs and initiatives designed to equip students with practical knowledge and industry relevant skills, as well as opportunities for internships and future employment within the company.

University representatives from LSO and AARO engaged in discussions on how the proposed collaborations align with DLSU D's mission of providing holistic, industry responsive education. Both parties expressed optimism about developing meaningful partnerships that will enhance student learning experiences, career readiness, and exposure to global industry practices.

DLSU-D and Australia's Institute of Surveying and Civil Design Training: 60 Software Licenses Donated to CEAT



De La Salle University–Dasmariñas (DLSU-D) formalized a strategic partnership through a Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) with Australia's Institute of Surveying and Civil Design Training (ISCDT) and 12d Solutions Pty Ltd.

A highlight of the partnership is the generous donation of 60 licensed copies of industry-standard software. This high-value contribution provides Lasallian students and faculty with hands-on access to global technologies in civil engineering, surveying, and infrastructure modeling.

For February 2026, total funds generated amounted to ₱45,890,885.57, consisting of ₱560,110.57 in cash contributions and ₱45,330,775.00 in in-kind donations.

Cash inflows were primarily derived from the Externally Funded Scholarship (₱456,859.77), Lasallian SPOON Donations (₱57,000.00), Crowd Funding Activity (₱20,900.80), DLSU-D Merchandise sales (₱19,450.00), Lasallian SPOON Program (CLAC) (₱3,900.00), and support to the Lasallian Community Development Center (₱2,000.00).

In-kind contributions were significantly bolstered by the Donation of Software Licenses amounting to ₱45,264,000.00, alongside ₱66,775.00 worth of donations for Bahay Pag-Asa.

The substantial in-kind software license donation accounts for the majority of the month's total inflow, reflecting strengthened institutional partnerships and expanded resource support. Cash collections continue to sustain scholarship assistance, community engagement initiatives, and program-based fundraising efforts. Overall, February's performance demonstrates continued stakeholder confidence and strong external collaboration in support of University programs and strategic priorities.
