Our volunteer doctors, medical students, and the LCDC team, led by Dr. Grace Red, along with program and project officers Sofia Gapasin, Rona Serrano, Maria Nena Caspe, and volunteer staff Edith Saulog Jordan and Ken Raphael Jordan, ensured that everyone received excellent care.

A crucial part of the event was raising awareness about online sexual abuse targeting children. The Batang Ligas project team, including Sammy Domingo, Gina, and Keavy Cuevas, facilitated this advocacy.

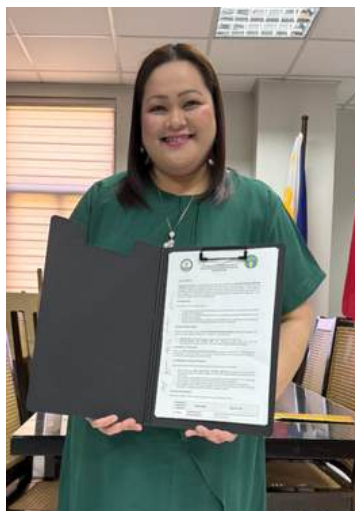

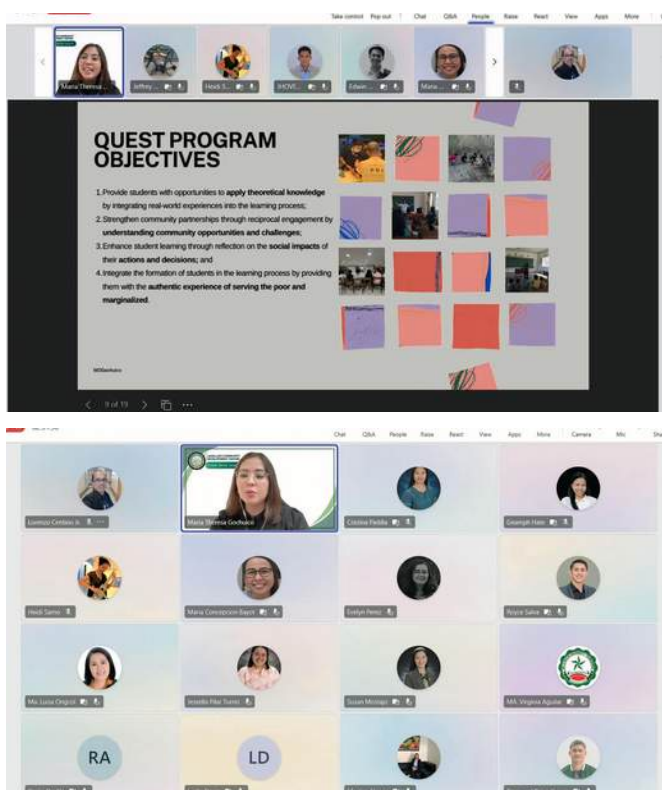

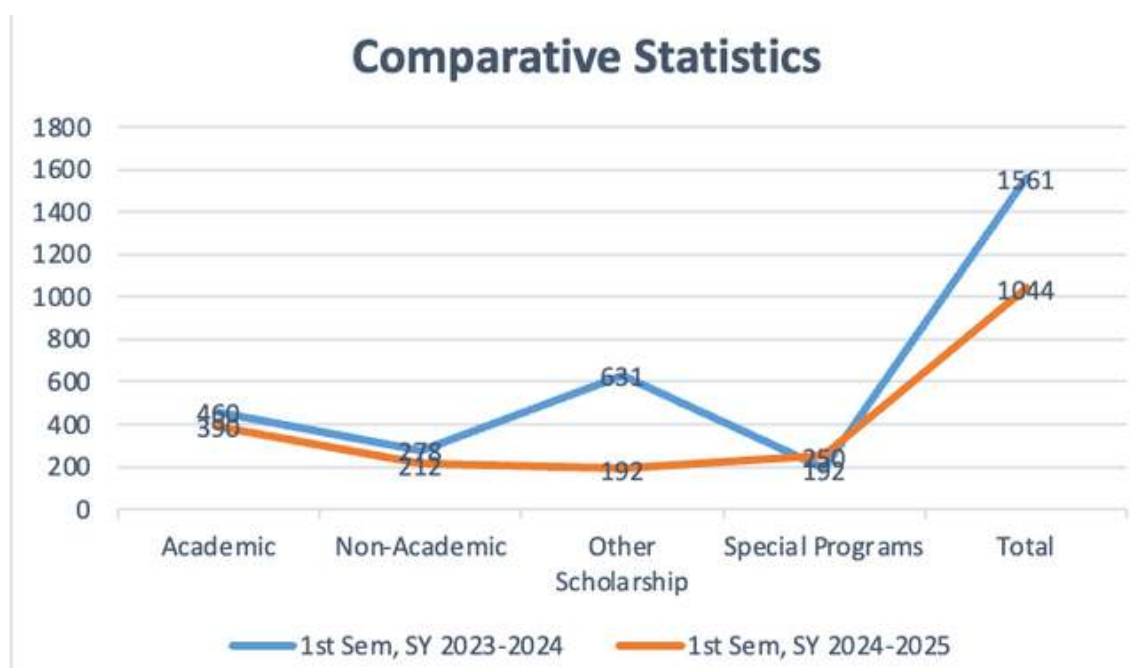
