The audit also showed that the University was compliant with the systems submitted to the auditing body. Thank you to all the offices, faculty, and staff who worked hard to achieve this recognition for the university.

We are expecting to receive the certification this month. This is a testament that the University's management system is compliant with global standards for educational organizations (EOMS).
