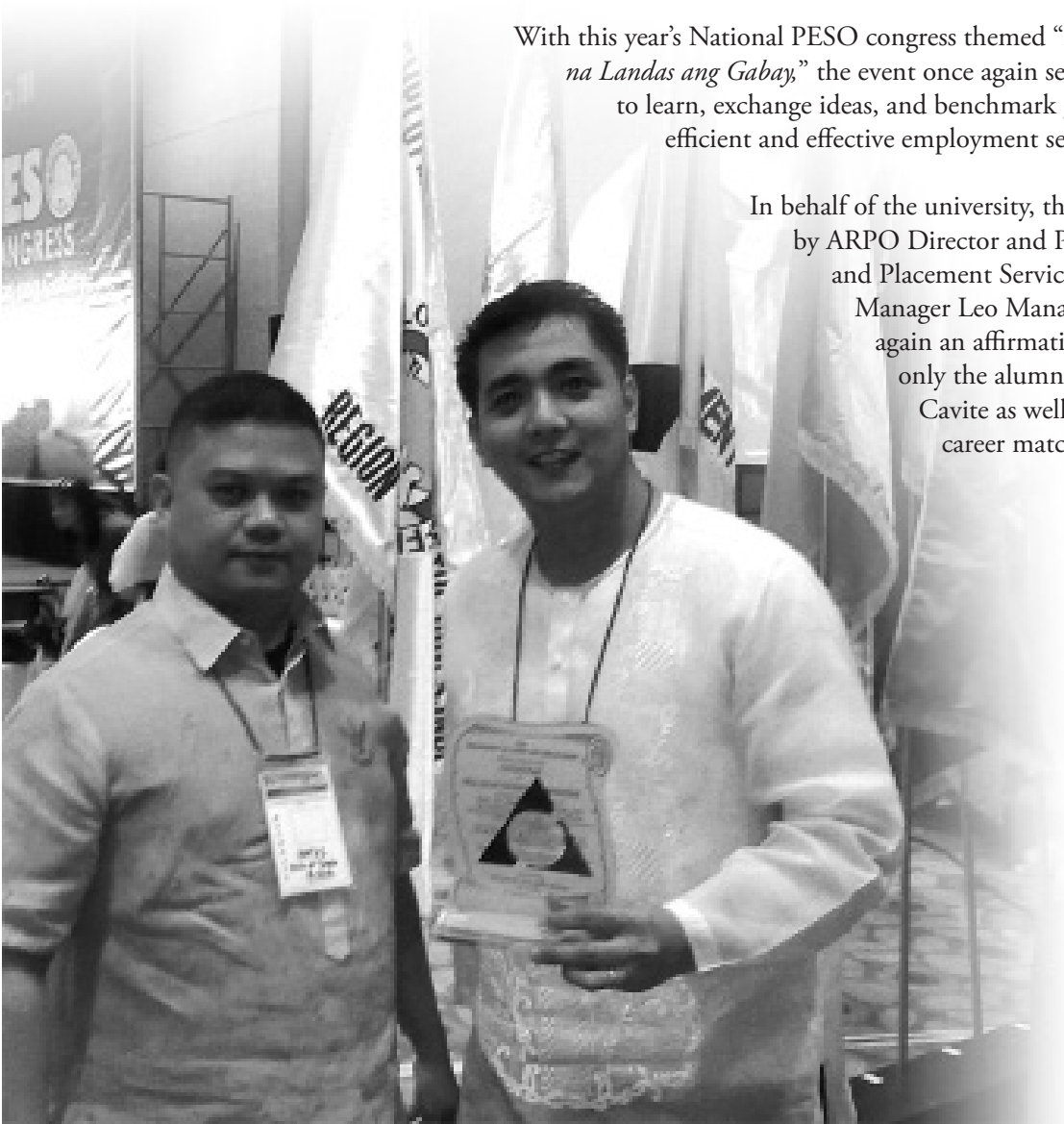


ARPO grabs Regional Best PESO

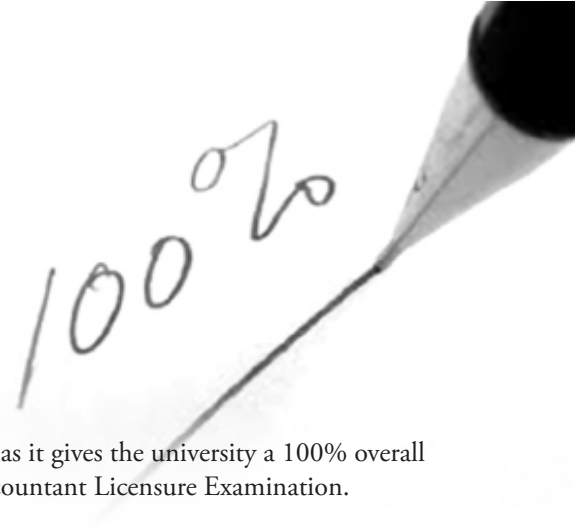

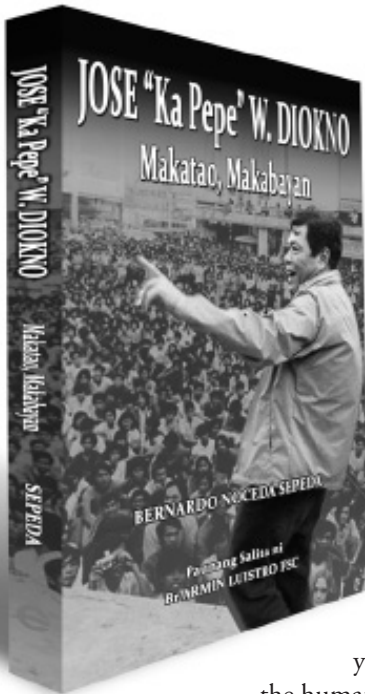


DLSU-D posts 100% in CPA board exam

Jose “Ka Pepe” W. Diokno, authored by Religious Education Department faculty Dr. Bernardo Sepeda, was recently launched at the Yuchengco Building Lobby of De La Salle University-Manila with the presence of highly acclaimed writers Dr. Isagani Cruz and F. Sionil Jose, among others.

Jose W. Diokno, or more commonly called “Ka Pepe,” is a stranger to the ears of today’s youth despite his many influential advocacies for

the human rights of the Filipinos during his lifetime. He is a hero not as popular as Ninoy Aquino is to the majority of the youth, or make it to the majority of the Filipino people. By the end of the Marcos regime in 1986, gross deployment from 1975 hit 2,372,506 contract workers.

Darating Din Ang Araw...

Maliwanag pa sa akin ang pangyayari. Alas-tres ng madaling araw, nakasindi ang maliwanag na ilaw, nakalabas lahat ang mga damit at nakabukas ang isang malaking lalagyanan. Unti-unting sinisilid ng isang lalake ang mga bagay na nakalatag sa kama—damit, personal na kagamitan, pasaporte. Nandoon ako sa isang tabi. Nagmamasid. Nag-iisip. Bigla na lang bumulalag ang

mga katanungan sa aking bibig.

“Daddy, bakit po ba kailangan pang umalis ka pa? Hindi ba pwedeng dito ka na lang mag-trabaho?”

“Kung pwede nga lang. Pero hindi, anak. Ito ang kinagisnang kong trabaho. Nasa ibang bansa ang pera.”

“[...] Kaya ikaw, anak, mag-aral ka nang mabuti. Magtapos ka ng pag-aaral at maging doktor ka para hindi mo na kailangang mangibang bansa para mapag-aral at mapakain ang mga magiging anak mo.”

Mas tumindi ang luhang umaagos mula sa aking mga mata.

“Babalik din si Daddy. I love you, anak.”

Huling mga patak ng luha na iyon. Hindi na ako muling nagpadala sa nais isabog ng aking damdamin at isipan. Pitong taong gulang pa lang ako noon. Labing-pitong taong gulang na ako ngayon.

Ang lumaki na walang ama ay isang bagay na hindi ko iniiyakan taun-taon. Naging manhid na siguro ako. Nasanay na ako sa ganitong klase ng buhay. Palaging nandyan ang ina, bihirang makapiling ang ama. Bilang sa daliri ang mga Pasko at kaarawang kasama namin siya. Madalang ang mga panahong nandyan ang isang ama upang makisalo sa kasiyahan ng pamilya. At ano ang resulta? Tila hindi buong pamilya, emosyonal na pasakit, malalim na kauhawan para sa edukasyon, masidhing kagutuman para sa pagbabago at matayog na pangarap.

Oo! Hindi nagsilbing hadlang ang kalungkutan ng pagkakaroon ng Expat na magulang. Hindi naging balakid ang pangungulila sa pisikal at emosyonal na presensya ng isang ama. Bagkus, lahat ng ito ay nagudyok sa akin upang mangarap, magsipag at magpunyagi.

Bilang isang anak ng Pinoy Expat, ang papel ko sa pagpapaunlad ng pamayanan ay nalilimitahan lamang sa kung ano ang kaya kong gawin sa kasalukuyan. Alam ko rin na hindi ko kayang baguhin at mapaunlad ang ating pamayanan sa isang iglap lamang.

Bagama't ganito ang situasyon, alam ko rin na hindi ito hadlang upang maging walang silbi ang aking magagawa. Naniniwala ako

sa kinatigan ng ating pambansang bayani na ang kabataan ang pag-asa ng bayan.

Bilang tagapagtaguyod ng aking kapakanan, naniniwala ang aking mga magulang, lalo na ang aking ama, na edukasyon ang isa sa mga susi upang magkaroon ako ng maginhawang buhay. Ganito rin naman ang aking paniniwala kaya nga't labing-apat na taon ng buhay ko ay iginugol ko sa pagsusunog ng kilay.

Bilang doktor sa hinaharap, ninanais kong gamitin ang aking mga natutunan dito sa Pilipinas. Ayaw kong mangibang bansa sapagkat nais kong paglingkuran ang aking kapwa Pilipino na hindi biniyayaan ng kakayahan upang magpagamot. Mukha mang hindi makatotohanan at mapangarapin ang aking hangarin, ito ay resulta lamang ng kalagayang dinadanas ko ngayon—ang pagkakaroon ng Expat na ama. Kailanman ay di ko pipiliing mawala ang aking mga anak sa aking mga bisig at hindi ko nanaising maudyok ang aking kapwa Pilipino na mangibang bansa dahil sa hirap ng buhay. Sa aking pahayag na ito ay hindi ko inaalisan ng karangalan ang mga bagong bayani ng ating bansa sapagkat alam kong walang kapalit ang kanilang mga sakripisyo upang matulungan ang kanilang mga pamilya at ang bansa. Nais ko lamang ipahayag ang aking sentimiyento na sana, dumating ang araw na wala nang magulang ang mangingibang bansa. Nais kong ibulalas, na sana, lahat ng Paskong dadaan ay kumpleto ang pamilyang Pilipino. At nais kong hilingin, na sana, wala nang anak ang luluha dahil sa pangungulila.

Sabi sa Mateo 5:16, “Lumiwanag na gayon ang inyong ilaw sa harap ng mga tao; upang mangakita nila ang inyong mabubuting gawa, at kanilang luwalhatiin ang inyong Ama na nasa langit.”

Sa pamumuhay ko nang malugod ayon sa nais ng Diyos, nilalayon kong makakita ng bahid ng liwanag sa aking buhay ang mga kabataang nawawalan ng pag-asa. Nais kong madama nila ang presensya ng Panginoon sa aking pamumuhay. Gusto kong malaman nila

na ang mga pagsubok sa buhay ay di mawawala ngunit kagaya nito, hindi rin mawawala ang Diyos sa ating piling. Dumating man ang mga bagyo at hagupit ng buhay, mananatiling bukas ang bisig ng Panginoon, handang tumanggap at yumakap sa mga nangangailangan. Sa pakikisangkot ko sa mga isyung panlipunan at pagabot ko ng kamay sa aking kapwang nangangailangan, nais kong makita nila ang isang aktibong Kristiyano—dinamiko at puno ng prinsipyo. Sa gayon, kapag nasilayan nila ang liwanag na taglay ng Diyos, muling tutubo sa kanilang mga puso ang pag-asa. Kanilang mapagtatanto na dapat silang mag-aral nang mabuti, makapagtapos at makakakuha ng trabaho. Sa gayon, magiging miyembro sila ng pwersa ng kabataang nag-aalab ang hangarin sa pagbabago at kaunlaran sa lipunan.

Hindi ko man mabago ang lipunan sa isang iglap, limitado man ang kakayahan ko at maliit man ako kung maituturing, hindi ito hadlang upang ako'y kumilos at mag-ambag sa pagbabago sa ikabubuti ng ating Inang Bayan. Ayon nga sa Lasalyanong panalangin, “Hindi man ako ang liwanag, maaari naman akong maging mitsa. [Even if I am not the light, I can be the spark.]”

BPI's search recognizes the children of Overseas Filipino Workers who excel in academics, business and sports and display leadership qualities in the community. 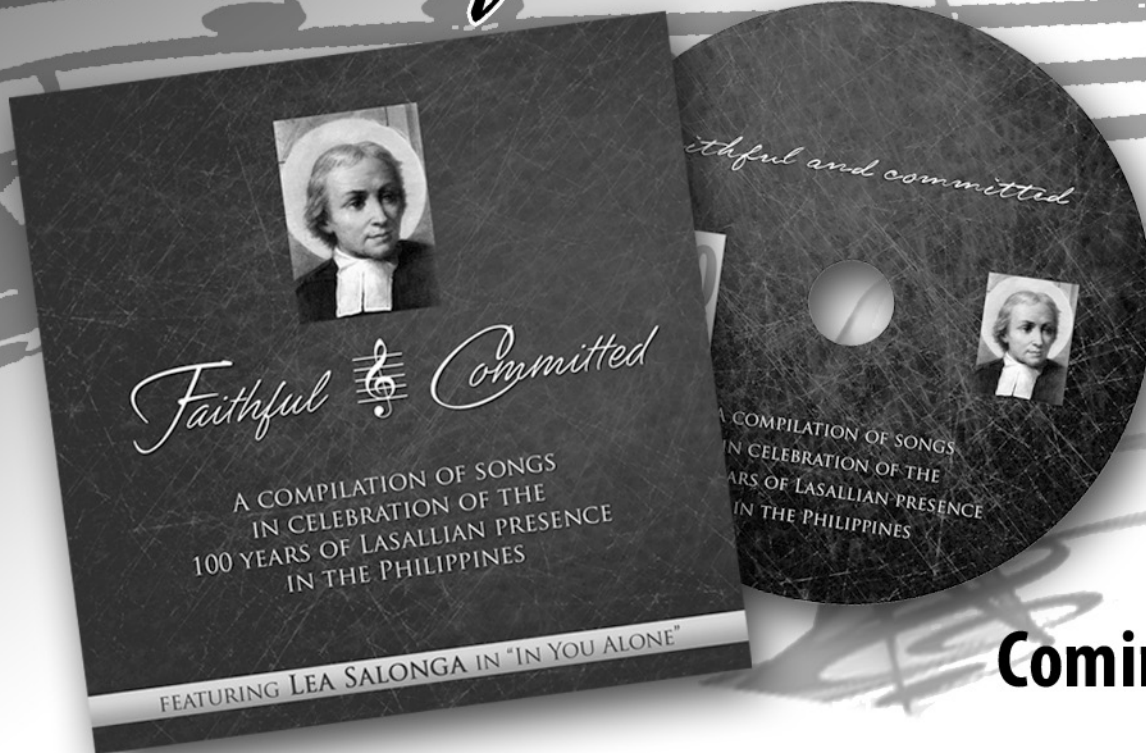
Olaes furthered that the
